Saturday 24th October, 1874 -REPEAL OF THE CONTAGIOUS DISEASES ACT

Tuesday evening last, W.T.Swann Esq., representative for the Northern Counties League, gave a lecture in favour of the repeal of these Acts, in the Mechanics' hall, Long Preston, to a small but attentive audience. After a full explanation of the nature and operation of the Acts for nearly two hours, the following resolution was put to the meeting and carried unanimously, "that the two members for the North West Riding, Lord F. Cavendish and Sir. M.Wilson, be requested to support the Bill, which is intended to be brought before Parliament next session by Sir. Harcourt Johnstone, MP, to repeal the Contagious Diseases Act. Votes of thanks brought the meeting to a close.

Saturday 12th December, 1874. CRICKET CLUB CONCERT LONG PRESTON

The annual entertainment on behalf of the funds of the club, was given in the Mechanics' hall on Friday 11th inst. The club had been very fortunate in securing the assistance of friends from Settle, Bradford and Keighley and the programme was consequently of a first-class character. Mr. Watson, of Bradford gave the "village Blacksmith" and "my sweetheart when a boy". Two of Harry Clifton's semi-comic duettes were very efficiently rendered by Miss E. Wetherellof Settle and Mr. E.G.Robinson, of Keighley, and the latter also contributed two songs, "The Gipsy's Laughing Song" and "I am so volatile". Mr. Newton of Bolton Bridge proved himself an admirable exponent of the humorous as both his songs were persistently redemanded and he complied in each case with a substitute to his own accompaniment. Mr. W.A.Robinson, of Keighley, acquitted himself creditably in his song "Come live with me". and also in a duet with Miss E.Wetherell. The local talent had good representatives in the Misses Wildman's, who gave the duet, "We have been friends together", very pleasingly, and Mr. Callum who kept up his good name in tastefully singing "Tom Bowling" and "She wore a wreath of roses". Masters G.Becroft and John Guy each made an impression and W.Armstrong's good quality of voice told well in a beautiful song "Keep me in your memory". Mr. J. Wrathall, music teacher, presided at the piano. In spite of the stormy weather, the attendance was highly satisfactory and the club will have a "nest-egg" towards the expenses of the coming year.
